## A Guide for Parents

## These are the vaccinations your baby needs!

At birth	НерВ
2 months	HepB + DTaP + PCV13 + Hib + Polio + RV 1-2 mos <sup>1</sup>
4 months	HepB² + DTaP + PCV13 + Hib + Polio + RV
6 months	HepB + DTaP + PCV13 + Hib <sup>3</sup> + Polio + RV <sup>4</sup> + Influenza <sup>5</sup> 6-18 mos <sup>1</sup>
12 months and older	<b>MMR + DTaP + PCV13 + Hib + Chickenpox + HepA<sup>6</sup> + Influenza<sup>5</sup></b> 12–15 mos <sup>1</sup> 15–18 mos <sup>1</sup> 12–15 mos <sup>1</sup> 12–15 mos <sup>1</sup> 12–23 mos <sup>1</sup>

Check with your doctor or nurse to make sure your baby is receiving all vaccinations on schedule. Many times vaccines are combined to reduce the number of injections. Be sure you ask for a record card with the dates of your baby's vaccinations; bring this with you to every visit.

Here's a list of the diseases your baby will be protected against:

HepB: hepatitis B, a serious liver disease	Polio: polio, a serious paralyzing disease
DTaP: diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), and pertussis	RV: rotavirus infection, a serious diarrheal disease
(whooping cough)	Influenza: a serious lung infection
<b>PCV13:</b> pneumococcal conjugate vaccine protects against a serious blood, lung, and brain infection	MMR: measles, mumps, and rubella
<b>Hib:</b> <i>Haemophilus influenzae</i> type b, a serious brain,	HepA: hepatitis A, a serious liver disease
throat, and blood infection	Chickenpox: also called varicella

Notes to above chart:

- 2. Your baby may not need a dose of Hep B vaccine at age 4 months, depending on the vaccine used. Check with your doctor or nurse.
- 3. Your baby may not need a dose of Hib vaccine at age 6 months, depending on the vaccine used. Check with your doctor or nurse.
- 4. Your baby may not need a dose of RV vaccine at age 6 months, depending on the vaccine used. Check with your doctor or nurse.
- 5. All children age 6 months and older should be vaccinated against influenza in the fall or winter of each year.
- 6. Your child will need 2 doses of HepA vaccine, given at least 6 months apart.
